Introduction

This album is a special gift for Mr. Fred Robey for his 70th birthday from the colleagues, beneficiaries and well wishers of the Carpathian Foundations.

Mr. Fred Robey and his family are special and committed donors of the local development initiatives managed by the Carpathian Foundations in 5 countries, Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Ukraine. They primarily support projects and initiatives focusing on the improvement of life and education of disadvantaged children and youth.

Fred is dedicated to invest his savings in education of youth, as he had the chance to complete his studies only after retiring. After hectically fighting his way, Fred decided to help those kids and adults who are in a similarly bad or even worse situation than he used to be in his early ages. In this respect, Fred's curriculum vitae tells more about his motivation and background.

During the years he challenged us to understand his wishes which were quite "unusual" for many people in our regions. "Helping those who help themselves" was not easy to be translated and to be understood for many of our local decision makers, especially for those who are involved in educational system. Also, when Fred was speaking about "community participation" more and more people realized that "community" started with "us" and that the power of personal example is crucial.

He travels in our region more than many of us, taking local trains and buses, meeting local people, inspiring and motivating youth not to get blocked by the disadvantages of their financial situation, and to have courage to follow their dreams.

This album summarizes and presents those initiatives, organizations and people whose ideas, dreams and efforts have become possible by Fred's support, in the Carpathian region, at our home, channeled by the Carpathian Foundations.

For those who do not know him we strongly recommend to read this album, as it is a "living story" of Fred's life-work in Europe, and tells a lot about him. As Winston Churchill said about Fred ☺ "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give".

Thank you very much, Fred, for all your support, generosity, commitment, and eminently being who you are! It is a true and rare privilege to work with you.

Thank you for challenging us to go beyond our limits, in understanding what our communities need, what we can do for them, and how important constructive communication is between people.

We hope we will spend at least additional 70 years with you.

Curriculum Vitae of the American philanthropist

Some people are born with advantages and others are not. For Fred Robey, an ordinary middle-class American, it was not wealth or connections, but rather a strong determination to take what he was given and turn it into something positive - a determination that would eventually touch lives around the globe. Fred grew up in a blue-collar household in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, his mother a housewife and his father a labourer. It was expected that he would one day work in the local steel mill until retirement. Fred was the oldest of five children, bearing the responsibilities of an adult: at thirteen, he got his first job delivering newspapers, and has worked ever since. He learned to rely on himself, and did not like to ask for help. Fred saw his family in poverty and decided that his life would be different, taking the stories of Horatio Alger he read as a child to heart.

With a rebellious spirit, on his eighteenth birthday, Fred joined the US Army in 1958, and was stationed in Germany during the Cold War from 1959-1961. When he returned to the US, he took what odd jobs he could find, including selling ice cream. But it was answering an ad in the local newspaper for an accounting course that sparked his lifelong career. Soon after he began the course, Fred was hired by the United Parcel Service (UPS), which was expanding its common carrier operations in the Pittsburgh area. At 23, Fred started out in an entry-level position as a mail clerk.

Fred began climbing the ranks at UPS from mail clerk to payroll clerk, accounting clerk to supervisor to office manager, setting his sights on the position of District Controller. He was part of the team that established UPS operations in Texas, and subsequently worked in a number of districts across the US. He finished his career working in the Corporate Finance and Accounting Department. In total, he worked with UPS for 32 years.

In addition to his work, Fred put himself through school by taking night courses at various business schools and community colleges along the way. He started his studies in 1962, and received his diploma from Oglethorpe University in 1997 with a self-directed major.

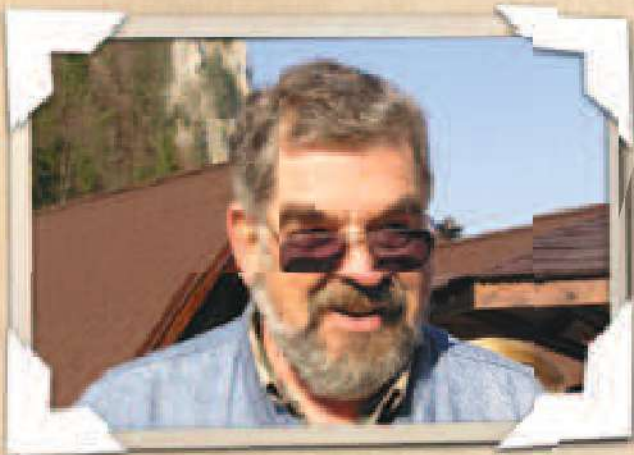
Through his hard work and sound investments, Fred became financially secure with an interest in giving back instilled in part by UPS's philanthropic philosophy. Upon retirement, Fred began focusing on community activities, namely teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) to newly arrived immigrants and refugees in Atlanta, Georgia. There, he met a volunteer from Romania, which led him to teach ESL at the University of Transylvania.

Fred identifies his philanthropic goals as foremost in education, as well as seeking to help people who help themselves, and dispelling negative stereotypes through people-to-people contact. His main philanthropic recipients include the EastWest Institute, the University of Transylvania, the Carpathian Foundation, Oglethorpe scholarships, and the United Way. Looking forward, Fred would like to create educational opportunities for young people in the Carpathian region.

Fred is very proud of his family. After Fred's first marriage ended in divorce, he married his current wife Maddy in 1989, and they successfully blended their families. All five children are successful in career and personal life. Fred has eleven grandchildren.

Fred estimates having travelled to 50 countries across five continents. The more he travels, the more his belief is reinforced that people have the same basic needs and desires - food, shelter, education and peace. He is an avid reader, with a particular interest in history and philosophy, and lives by his principles. Fred's desire is to give most of his money away to those in need. All he humbly asks for in return is a handshake.

At Carpathian Foundation, Fred Robey funds small grants to qualified organizations specializing in education.





Carpathian Scholarship Program

It was Fred Robey, a committed donor of the Carpathian Foundation Network, who had the idea of the Carpathian Scholarship Program in 2005, so he donated 100,000 USD to launch the fund. It was the donator's wish to start a 5-year education sponsorship program in five countries of the Carpathian region.

The Carpathian Scholarship Program's goals are:

- To provide opportunities for education to talented young people from the Carpathian region.
- To raise qualified young professionals, willing to contribute to the development of their region.
- To enhance awareness of regional identity among young people.

The students have to be residents of the Carpathian region and to represent outstanding results in learning, and not to be able to study for financial reasons. The Carpathian Foundations started a co-operation with selected high schools and universities in order to identify potential candidates. As each country has different claims and a different educational system, the program is different in each country. Due to the commitment and flexibility of Fred Robey, the program is able to satisfy the diverse needs of the countries and to specify the program. Up till 2009, thirty-five students have been able to win the scholarship.

This program enhances the self esteem of the students and develops a desire on the part of the students to remain in the region after their studies are completed so that they may contribute to the well-being of their communities.

The Scholarship Program runs in the North-East part of the country (the Borsod-Abaúj-Zemplén, Hajdú-Bihar, Heves, Jász-Nagykun-Szolnok and Szabolcs-Szatmár-Bereg counties). The Program is implemented at the University of Miskolc with the assistance of the Gender Studies and Equal Opportunities Center of the University of Miskolc and with the Equal Opportunities House of Miskolc. Till 2009 six students have been supported, four of them have already finished their university studies with excellent results, and all of them would like to work and live in the region. In Hungary, participants based on their study profile and in co-operation with a local NGO, agree to work out and manage a one-year volunteer project called 'For the region - in the region'.

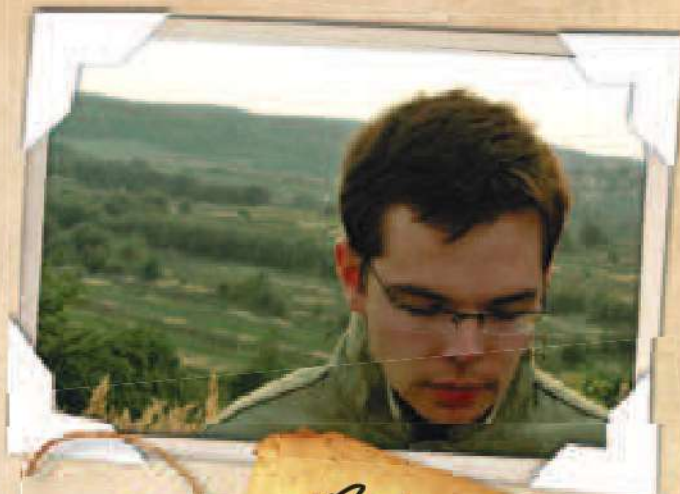

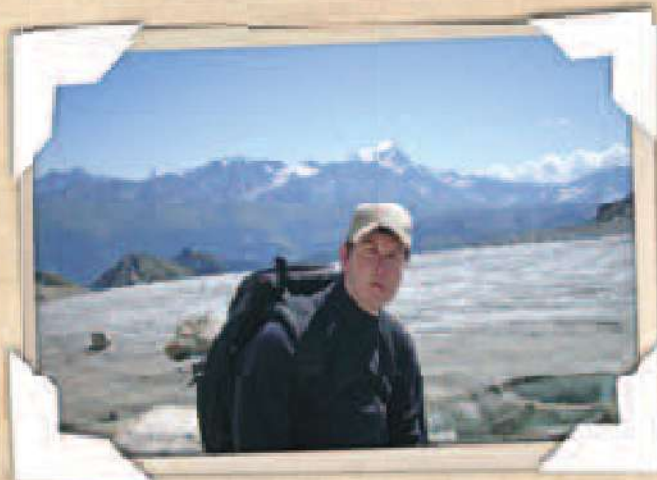

The unique feature of the Program in Poland is that it gives priority to high school seniors to enable them to enter university and 'survive' the first year, which is the most difficult year at higher education.

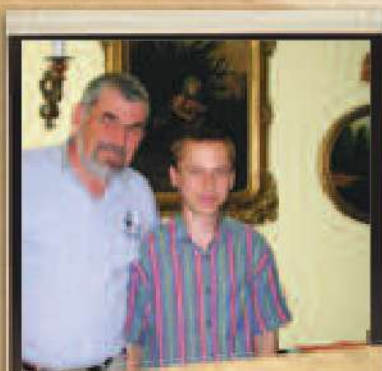

In the period 2007/2009, by Fred Robey Scholarship Program have benefited a total of 15 students from Romania - 9 of Sighetu Marmatiei and 6 of Oradea. In the 2009/2010 school year, is being implemented the 3rd phase of the Scholarship Program Fred Robey, with a number of 8 scholarships offered: 4 were covered by Fred's donation, 2 by CF Romania (gathered from the 2% donations) and 2 others supported by Rotary Club Sighet and Rotary Club Oradea. Eligible students are those from university centers of Oradea, Baia-Mare and Sighetu Marmatiei, and accomplish several criteria, such as: they have graduated the 1st university year, they come from a disadvantaged social environment, are active members in an NGO, contribute to the development of their region and have a clear vision of their careers.



"With the scholarship I managed to finance my driving license, which gave me more independence in terms of transport which for me is very difficult. With the laptop that I purchased through the scholarship, I could complete various necessary educational tasks (essays, lesson projects, final paper etc.) I act as a volunteer in the Ruhama Foundation where I am involved in various activities of the organization. Ukraine

In Ukraine it was decided by Fred Robey that the main aspect of the scholarship was to pay the tuition fee for a student with excellent educational performance living in difficult conditions. The main target educational institution is the Faculty of Social Science of Uzhgorod National University. Together with the tuition fees a student received pocket money and could choose books.

After the first year of the Program implementation students who had been awarded the scholarship were supported further if they had good academic results. Due to the relatively small tuition fees and amount of pocket money (in comparison to the amount granted per country) it has become possible to award 1-2 scholarships additionally every year. Therefore in 2009-2010 academic years 6 students have been supported and 10 student totally for whole period of the Program.

One of the specifics of the program in Ukraine is that the tuition fee differs for each newly supported student differs according to a grade and course they were attending. Voluntary work of the scholars assisted to development of their organizational skills, managing of documentation, provided knowledge on NGOs and third sector.

Rapid Response Fund



The experience is that socially and economically disadvantaged communities find it difficult to stand up successfully to social and economic challenges having only to depend on their own resources. In many cases these people do have the motivation and ideas but not the information and skills how to implement their development ideas and not the money, which makes it harder for them to surmount difficulties.

The Carpathian Rapid Response Fund was established and financed by Fred Robey to address the urgent, critical needs of communities living in the Carpathian region that cannot be supported through other resources in due time. It is directed to a group/individual that is disadvantaged, with proven insufficient financial means. It represents an investment in the future of an initiative – the outcome should make a difference. The beneficiaries can be individuals, organizations or informal groups. With the help of Fred till 2009 the following organizations and individuals were supported in realizing their improvement efforts. The procedures for a non-bureaucratic approach and local empowerment for selecting and awarding the grants were developed.

As the Hungarian government decided to close most of the side-lines of the Hungarian Railway system mainly in rural areas in order to decrease the budget deficit of the Hungarian State Railway Company, the project was invented to initiate a professional conciliation about closing the railway branch lines. It was decided to do this compliance without any debates and making reconciliation with the relevant stakeholders and also involving the local inhabitants. This governmental order would induce recidivate in travelling in the region, especially in the bordering areas between Hungary, Romania and Slovakia. Local, national and international travelers and those companies that are dealing with delivering goods would also be affected by this restriction.

Rom Som Foundation School launch developments

The main goal of the project is to obtain a marketable qualification for Roma youth and to acquire the infrastructural developments and the necessary school equipment to the start of the academic year. As a result the Rom Som Foundation established a special school in 2008 to offer primary and technical education opportunities to local, mainly Roma students. They are also going to get the permission for 2009 to be able to provide professional courses as well as painting, carpentering, gardening, masonry, shop assistant, etc. Today 75 children are studying with 15 teachers.

Supporting of Roma fine Art

The request for the support came from the Hungarian Institute of Culture and Art which organized a competition for Roma artists to submit their works in the subject of history of the Roma. CF-HU believes that the Roma culture and traditions need to be preserved for future generations as they are also part of our culture, and with this contribution we have been able to highlight the importance of Roma history and Roma culture and we could raise the awareness that there is a great need to support such kinds of initiatives

In 2008 in Budapest during the Ferencváros Roma Days celebration organized by the Ministry of Education and Culture, the Hungarian Institute of Culture and Art and the local authorities of Ferencváros, Carpathian Foundation helped to establish the DISKURZUS and the RIG-RIGATAR program. These programs hope to put an end to the discrimination against the Roma.

As a result, on the 10th of October 2008 within the frame of an award-giving ceremony, József Ferkovics, a Hungarian Roma artist was rewarded 1.000 USD as a scholarship and an award.

"In a crazy and crooked world like the one we live in, people like Fred Robey and gestures like his, seems to be really unusual, even bizarre. Let me explain myself: how could I if I had a certain amount of money – and let's not talk about its source, how could I give that amount to other and why should I do this at all? Fred Robey is a wonderful exception to this kind of thinking as we see it, and has often been understood. I cannot call Fred Robey anything but a fierce, selfish man. But he is a great selfish man and an example of the most beautiful form of selfishness – helping others in order to make yourself happy. Such people are extremely selfish, but isn't this the noble form of selfishness? He understood something with a disarming simplicity that our parents and the older generations knew as well as The Lord's Prayer. A simple philosophy – the philosophy of a pheasant. He knows that if in the spring he sows his field, and if God gives a good year, in the autumn he will harvest the crops. I noticed in Fred Robey an unusual tenacity. 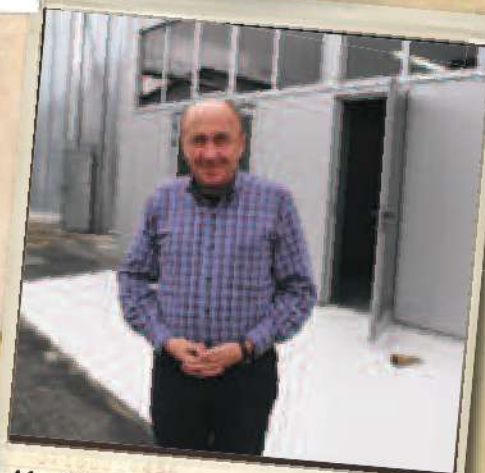

The girl's mother is a widow and is bringing 2 children on her own.

The support provided helped the mother to raise additional funds and to pay for the treatments.

Development Fund and Community Development by Education Fund in 2007. These resources aim to provide educational opportunities for all members of communities throughout the Carpathian Region with special emphasis on improving the opportunities of young people.

Community Development by Education Fund

The fund is intended to establish a network of community centers for intergenerational-relationship activities, adult education, language training, libraries, tutoring of talented but disadvantaged youth, and other projects that improve the quality of life of the people living in rural communities, where the communities themselves operate these centers.

The long-term objective of the Community Centers Development Program is to establish sustainable community centers and thus enhance the cohesion in communities, where the members co-operate and solve their own problems. The initiatives of the schools, educational institutions and civil organizations which serve this community-building purpose, receive support.

The title of the program has been changed to "Community Centre Development Fund" in Hungary in order to emphasize the importance of community development initiatives of local schools, serving as community centers for adult education, and enhancing the citizens' public participation in smaller rural settlements where cooperation is essential for further local improvement.

Telkibánya was a conscious choice where the community centre should be created. The settlement already has the infrastructure - the newly rebuilt school (2006), a community house with free space, and adequate amount of quality accommodation with boarding facilities - that makes it suitable for becoming a social service provider centre without too much extra expenditure. The following programs were designed for the Community Centre:

1. Professional training (with accreditation)
2. Community training (community development, democracy building, citizen participation, non-profit life, advocacy, etc.)
3. People's college, Sunday school-type education (peer-learning, education based on local needs)
4. Youth Community Training Centre
5. Thematic forums, festivals
6. Micro-regional community database, interactive media surface (needs analysis, map of opportunities; proposals, projects, training material, other community information)

We are building our future upon that idea. Fred's donation and the development in Telkibánya became the basis of another idea: participating in a program supported by the EU called LEADER. The project focused on the parents of the elementary school students, who are unemployed and live in disadvantaged environments. 20 parents, under the guidance of their children and a lecturer learnt how to use computers, open documents, write their CVs, and search for information and job opportunities on the Internet and so on.

The project created space for people active in community life (teachers, pupils, parents) to strengthen the coherence of the community. It supported and motivated cooperation among the generations.

Haličanda, Košice My place in the community

The one-year project focused on mobilizing all age groups within the community. The organization offered many different activities to involve all generations into an informal way of education. One of the goals was to strengthen the relationships within the community, as the organization acts in an environment where people do not care about what's going on in their community.

Community Center in Hanušovce nad Topľou

The Community Center within the framework of its activities brings educational and free time programs to Roma children and young people. The goal of the project was to support initiatives of a community center in the role of an educational center and to stimulate cooperation between people involved in community life (teachers, students, parents, business, non profit organizations and self-governments).

Ukraine



Local schools have always been the real centers of community life in small villages. In many respects the school is the core of the community. Practice shows that closing of a local school usually leads to a rapid decline and quite often to the disappearance of the village itself. This is true for the small community of Dunkovytsya village with a population of less than 900 people. Most of the inhabitants work outside the community and have a few common interests. At the same time children attend the local school. This fact makes the school the only institution in the community which is able to integrate the whole community. Recognizing this opportunity, the community launched several activities aimed at turning the school into a real community center. Most of these activities are connected to the establishment of a partnership relations with all stakeholders in the community (authorities, local small businesses, the church, parents etc.). Nevertheless, the active involvement of the public is limited by the modest opportunities of the school to provide anything attractive for the adults. The project's goal is to establish community center in Dunkovytsya village based in the local school. Granted amount: USD 15 000

2008

Establishment of Community Center in Dunkovytsya village

A school principle, Ms Natalia Korovska, a very active person having good books with the chair of the Rayon council made the local authorities contribute about USD 18 000 instead of USD 8 000 previously committed. Living in a small provincial community located 900 km from the capital, she found ways to involve one of the most popular national (!) "1+1" TV channel and "Nedilya (Sunday)" newspaper to enlighten the project and its funder - Fred Rabey whose name is on a memorial board at the school. When Fred visited the site first he was terribly surprised to see the outdoor school toilets located next the courtyard, which is normal in most of the communities. The school principles was upset and happy at the same time - she could told the story to the authority people and it obviously encouraged the department of education to build indoor toilets in the school finally.



Carpathian Relief And Development Fund (CRDF) Program

The Carpathian Relief and Development Fund addresses larger scale projects that respond to relief emergencies of pilot educational or community development initiatives and primarily provides financial support for infrastructural development (renovation, furniture, equipments) of schools, foster houses and other kind of educational or children oriented institutions.



Poland

2005-2008 Support for the Primary School in Kostarowce



When Fred was to arrive with his second, but first official visit to Poland, the head teacher of the school sent the school handyman and the city mayor to collect Fred from the Slovak-Hungarian border. She told them specifically to wear smart clothes because the guest was very important and he might have felt offended if they wore casual outfits. So, despite the 30 degree heat, he and the mayor travelled to the border dressed in the suits. When they finally reached the meeting point, they fastened their ties and waited for their guest. Their surprise was enormous when they finally saw the American millionaire wearing a T-shirt and shorts and carrying a big tourist bag. They felt like overdressed fools and Fred started to wonder: do all handymen at Polish schools come to work in suits.

The main goal of the projects was to finish modernization of the old part of the school building, dated 1903 and opening a centre of education and development, serving children, youth and adults from the local community. The story of the continuous attempts and struggle to create good learning conditions for the local pupils moved Fred. He was intrigued by the fact that the members of the community cooperate with the school head teacher, who strives to improve the life of the local pupils. At the first meeting, Fred donated \$1000 for the most urgent needs, such as painting the classrooms and adjusting the school to safety standards.

This first meeting initiated the ongoing cooperation between Fred Robey and the school in Kostarowce.

The next visits resulted in further donations. The money was spent to create the Centre of Education and Development in the old part of the school building. It was officially opened in 2006 and named after Fred Robey a year later. Since its opening, the centre has been a very important place in Kostarowce. Not only did it enable pupils to study in larger and safer classrooms, but it also met the needs of the local community. Due to Fred's further support, the centre was equipped with new computers and a language laboratory. It has gained a tremendous value for the pupils, as for local youth who are now able to use the internet as a tool for education. Such activities as, for instance, handicraft courses and dance classes

are currently organized in the centre. Fred's engagement in the life of the village community has been growing constantly with each visit to Poland. Recently, he has donated \$10 000 to the mayor of the village to purchase chairs for the local Community Centre, and he also supported the Village Housekeeping Association

with money for new outfits. Now, the Centre of Education and Development is a great place to study, to cultivate local traditions and for entertainment.

The main target group of the Program are disadvantaged students coming from the internal diasporas and studying in Hungarian in any of the high schools in Cluj, Romania.

The main activities of the Torockó program were the renovation and extension of the Torockó Youth Retreat on the real estate owned by the Lyceum Foundation. The complex consists of three buildings and an open air area, which can now be fully used for educational work and training in all seasons. The Youth Retreat is suitable for organizing theme summer camps (on tourism, archaeology, ethnography etc.) which can give extra income to the foundation and facilitate the maintenance of the dormitories in the city.

More families worked on the construction of the room, for many it was a challenge to learn new things, for example how to build a wall to divide the room. Some families offered their free time, some helped with the transport of the material.

The room is now used for various activities. The PC is used by youth and adults; children spend their free time there according to the annual schedule. Seniors spend their time singing there, surfing the Internet as well.

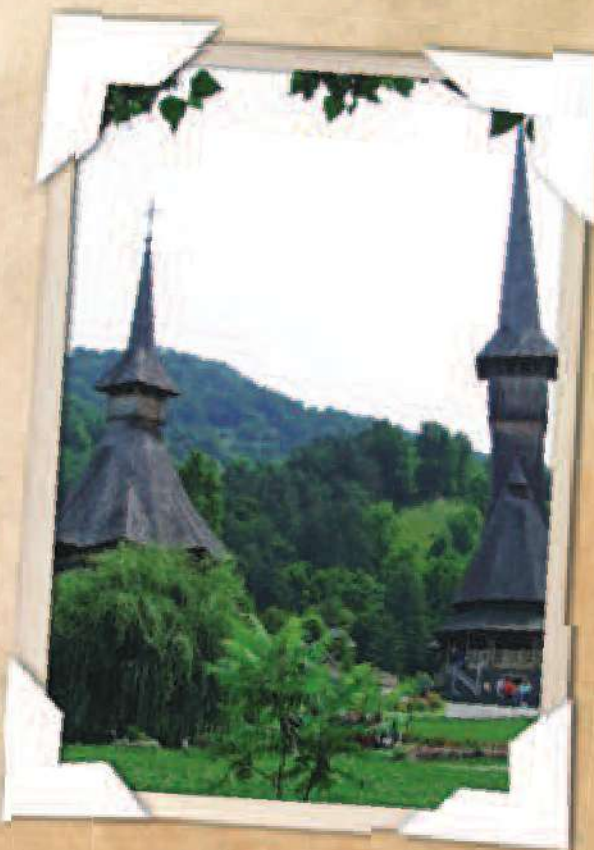

He decided to change this situation through his book donation program.

Fred Robey has collected books with the help of Oglethorpe University, Greater Atlanta Community Foundation, Sabre Foundation in Boston, Harvard University and many other libraries. He also gave monetary donations to provide the first 10,000 textbooks and in later years many more books and encyclopedias to those in need, and shipped them to the Carpathian region. As a result of his book donation program, several schools, university campuses, and other institutions benefited from Fred's attention and generosity. His main philanthropic recipients were:

The aim of the project was to motivate young people to participate in activities that would help them think about the future face of the place in which they live.

The task of the Košice secondary comprehensive high-school students was to create in teams a presentation of their common vision for Košice – the place where they live and study. They prepared the presentations „A Place Where We Want to Live” according to the formal set in English, and they could enrich them by their original student texts, pictures and videos, and thus create as interesting vision as possible of Košice as a town, in which they would like to make their future plans and dreams a reality.

To select a winner, the form of Internet voting on the Carpathian Foundation website was used. Students of the Secondary Comprehensive High School at Poštová Street were voted as winners. The winning school obtained the set of prestigious 32-volume Encyclopedia Britannica in English language and the members of the winning team received also other literary works in English.

Within the framework of the „Let's Read in English!” program, high schools in Eastern Slovakia had a chance to receive books written in American English. A letter with a proposal of getting 20 books in American English was sent to every Grammar School in Prešov and Košice regions. The schools that reacted to the „call” were given the books. More than 700 books of contemporary fiction, adventure and romance books donated by Fred were distributed to 37 high schools in Eastern Slovakia. The books have enriched the school libraries and help to improve the quality of English language teaching. The ability to communicate in English opens up new opportunities for gaining experience, traveling or establishing contacts.

Short Presentation of the Carpathian Foundation

In May 1992 the local and regional leaders of the neighboring areas of Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Ukraine discussed the methods how to promote and enhance cross-border cooperation in the Carpathian Mountains and the Tisza Valley. This initiative – the Carpathian Euroregion – marked the first attempt to create a „euroregion“, as an institutionalized form of cross-border cooperation. It was also the first grouping of its kind in Central and Eastern Europe, when the Ministers of Foreign Affairs, the local and regional leaders and the Secretary General of the Council of Europe, Mme Catherine Lalumiere officially established the Carpathian Euroregion in 1993.

The predecessor of Carpathian Foundation Network was created in 1995 to strengthen the civil society and local economies of the Carpathian Euroregion, to promote cross-border and inter-ethnic cooperation by its wide range of grant programs, and to act as a unique type of transfrontier regional foundation in the heart of Europe.

The Carpathian Foundation Network is run by and for the people of the Carpathian Euroregion. It has independent member-organizations in each of the five countries of the Euroregion, none of which are seated in the capital cities. The five member-organizations are legally independent and distinct organizations, in deference to varying local laws, and managing different programs according to the needs of their target area, but the network has common programs as well.

Carpathian Foundations support the development of their diverse and multi-ethnic communities. They apply a number of ways to encourage local partnerships and self-help; to provide training and funding resources to assist grassroots not-for-profit organizations and local governments. Carpathian Foundations work mostly with disadvantaged groups, and make every effort to target the most pressing issues in their communities.
